Firstly, thank you for allowing us at Priory School to care for your children and help them to grow. They are incredible and they inspire us all each and every day.

This report sets out the progress the school has made over the last year. Despite significant challenges the school is moving forward, delivering excellent teaching and learning opportunities for the community.

I am proud of the many achievements the school and the school community has made in the last year which include significant fundraising efforts, the development of the book vending machine scheme which was delivered in partnership with the Green Man Trust, and the roll out of the iron on school badges to help cut the cost of school uniform. The school has also opened its doors during the school holiday period to host Brecon's School Uniform Swop Shop which ensures good quality uniform items do not go to landfill.

The medium of education throughout the school is English as a first language with Welsh being taught as a second language. The school curriculum follows Curriculum for Wales. We have been fortunate enough to have previously been a pioneer school and Lead Enquiry school which has enabled us to embed the four purposes and the 12 pedagogical principles across the whole school. We refer to our classes as progression steps which is reflected in Curriculum for Wales. Progression Step 1 is our Reception class, Progression Step 2 is Year 1-3 and Progression Step 3 is Years 4-6. Within the new curriculum what we would traditional call subjects have been grouped into Areas of Learning and Experience (AoLEs). Throughout the academic year we have posted on our closed FACEBOOK group experiences the children have undertaken highlighting AoLEs and Mantle of the Expert practice, skills mornings and celebrations/specific events in our school calendar and how we explore/learn in our school.

The School's main pedagogical approaches are: Mantle of the Expert, a dramatic inquiry-based method of Teaching and Learning and Singapore Maths as a Mastery for Learning Approach in mathematics. We have an ongoing commitment in further research and implementation of a Reggio Emilia approach and ethos across the school through developing skills sessions in Progression Step 1 and 2 class and a skills morning in Progression Step 3 where children learn life skills such as cooking, woodwork skills and practice their cross curricular skills (literacy English and Welsh, numeracy and digital competence skills) across independent tasks.

















We continue to showcase our learning adventures and activities on our closed FACEBOOK group. Alongside this we communicate your child's progression and learning journey with you via parents evening and an end of year report.

We have had a very busy academic year with lots of exciting learning experiences, below is a snapshot of experiences the children have undertaken.

#### **Autumn 2023**

We had a wonderful from our Mayor. Michaela came into school and spoke to the children about her role, responsibilities and how she became the Mayor. We are sure it is going to inspire our young people to dream big and support one another in our community.

We also welcome our new setting on the School site, Enfys Fach which was kindly opened by Mark Drakeford, as always school was represented by our wonderful choir. We have welcomed many visitors into school but our Year 5&6 pupils have worked closely with Kirsty from Stump Up for Trees to established a sense of Cynefin, they have used the school grounds to explore nature, specifically trees and researched the uses they have to us as a community.

We are very proud of the change of our timetable where we prompt a well-being hour and our children explore many sports and fitness sessions. Our reception children enjoyed walks around The Groves and our older children enjoy representing our school at county level events such as cross country, netball and football.



#### Spring Term 2024

This term we have had more professionals coming in to work with us in school, we have had Chris from Project touchline come in and show us how we can explore Christian values through rugby.

Continuing with our Diocese links Ruth and Jenny, from the heritage trust came to work with Year 5 to explore their thoughts of the Cathedral and took on their thoughts and ideas of how we can make it more appealing to young people to entice them to come a explore its history.

Our colleagues from Sinfonia Wales came in and worked with our Year 4 pupils to create a song go with a theatrical performance in Theatr Brycheiniog.





















#### **Spring Term 2024 continued**

A sense of Cynefin, belonging is so important to us all, therefore through our Mantles and significant key advents in the welsh calendar have been further explored this year. Our children have enjoyed celebrating St Dwynwen's day through classroom-based activities and our older pupils from Year 3-6 thoroughly enjoyed the St David's Day march through town with our friends and schools across the Brecon Cluster. We have also enjoyed using our local facilities to research into the key events in local history our Year 5 and 6 pupils explored Victorian times in the museum and held a trial in the court room, it was brilliant to see the drama come alive and the children immerse themselves in history.

It is important to us as a whole school community that we are inclusive and share the wider world's values, traditions and celebrations, all the children have enjoyed exploring the lunar year this year and have created wonderful artistic pieces through not only artistic mediums, but through block play. They have also tasted and made delicious food.

#### Summer 2024

The summer term allowed us to further explore our natural environment and get outside, our Mantles had an environmental theme and we all also explored our forest school sites, having fun making mud monsters, den building and climbing trees.

Transition links were made with Brecon High School, for our Year 5 and 6 pupils through WOW days where they explored Science and Technology and Expressive arts activities.

We have really enjoyed elements of Hybrid learning as it means that we can meet with professional in the real world, our pupils in Year 3, 6 and reception class have met some Romodels where they have deepened their knowledge about marine biologists and Year 2 met the author Alexis Deacon when they had a Beegu day.

Our military families and their friends worked with other military children and SoFit professionals, this enable us to work with other pupils in our local community and help us develop our Health and Well-being skills through different exercises and games.

We love being together as a family and our school trips enable us to do that over the year our Year 6 children enjoyed and our Year 5 children enjoyed Llangrannog, but as a whole school we had lots of fun at Raglan Farm Park and we named the baby alpaca.

We've had lots of fun learning, exploring and acquiring new skills and extending existing skills, what a year we have had.



Assessment Data

Due to the implementation of the new curriculum for Wales data was collected from all pupils in Year 2-6 who undertook the national testing, which displayed a snapshot of data in the following areas: reading and comprehension, Mathematical reasoning and Mathematical procedural. However, no end of Progression Step data was collected other than half termly teacher testing assessment through pupil progress meetings and assessment in learning strategies demonstrated in the children's books.

Our Additional Learning Needs Co-Ordinator (ALNCO) is Mrs Shelley Hughes. The ALNCO evaluates provision for pupils with additional learning needs to ensure that resources are used effectively to support pupil's progress. The ALNCO works closely with all teachers and teaching assistants, professional colleagues within the Local Authority and support services to ensure children with ALN achieve their full potential and beyond.

#### **Healthy Living**





To encourage 'Healthy and Confident Individuals'; one of the four purposes in the new Curriculum for Wales. We continue to focus on healthy eating with the pupils sharing the messages with parents regarding healthy snacks at snack time as well as ensuring healthy recipes are cooked with the pupils in their class kitchens. Daily fitness take place every morning with pupils choosing the disciplines they wish to explore that week. Respectful debates, on a whole range of subjects through 'Picture News' is an important to the wellbeing of our children, this takes place daily through Philosophy for Children (P4C) sessions. All classes have access to drinking water and water cups/bottles throughout the school day.

Toilet Facilities and Cleaning of Toilets

Every two classes share one set of toilets (Reception & Year 1), (Year 2& Year 3), (Year 4 & Year 6), (Year 5 have access to the disabled toilet). Toilets are checked every morning and cleaned once a day at the end of the school day. To check the cleanliness checks are made throughout the day by a member of staff.

School Policies

Priory Church in Wales School has extensive policies that cover all area of its' work. Written in consultation with staff and the Governing Body a number of policies are updated each year. Global, National and Community Links




